- Call to Order by Convention Chair PDG E. "Paul" Ball at 9:15 a.m.
- Invocation given by Chaplain Vicki McCartney
- Pledge was led by 1st VDG Les Mize
- Song My Country 'Tis of Thee and God Bless America was led by PDG Marty VanZandt
- 1st VDG Les Mize introduced DG Audrey Wottrich
- DG Audrey Wottrich welcomed all in attendance and introduced her guests, PIP Bill Biggs, PID Dana Biggs, 4-A2 DG Al Kroell and his wife Christy, 4-C1 PDG Larry Marcum and his wife Ida. The PDG's in attendance were also recognized. Doug Weber (1973-74), Claude Schwarz (1981-82), Warren Oglove (1995-96), E. "Paul" Ball (1997-98), John Posey (2007-08), Barry Fredenburg (2008-09), Marty VanZandt (2009-10) and Warren "Buck" Larson (2014-15). Also introduced: 1st VDG Les Mize and 2nd VDG Barry Bialkoski.

Resolution No. 2017-116

RESOLUTION OF THE SOLANO COUNTY BOARD OF SUPERVISORS RECOGNIZING THE 100th ANNIVERSARY OF LIONS CLUBS INTERNATIONAL AND THEIR CONTINUED VOLUNTEERISM AND COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT ACROSS SOLANO COUNTY

WHEREAS, Lions Clubs International was founded in June 1917 by Melvin Jones and other Chicago businessmen to benefit their community. The organization's first meeting was held June 7, 1917 in Chicago, Illinois. The name "Lions" was chosen as a symbol of strength and courage and later was said to stand for: Liberty, Intelligence, Our Nation's Safety; and

WHEREAS, in 1925, an advocate for the disabled named Helen Keller attended the Lions Clubs International Convention and challenged their membership to become, "knights of the blind in the crusade against darkness." Today, Lions Clubs International is perhaps best known for its efforts to fight blindness and restore eyesight, however, the organization offers health programs to benefit those with hearing impairment, as well as a diabetes awareness program; and

WHEREAS, the long history of Lions Clubs International members helping their communities through philanthropy and volunteerism include: transforming a Michigan farmhouse into a school to train guide dogs for the visually impaired in 1939; the launch of youth clubs in 1957; the establishment of the Lions Clubs International Foundation in 1968, an organization which has given more than \$826 million in grants; partnering with The Carter Center to address river blindness in Africa and Latin America in 1995; the direction of more than \$15 million in relief funds for South Asia following a 2004 earthquake and tsunami, the award of their 10,000th grant and 148 millionth dose of Mectizan administered to treat river blindness in 2011; and the launch of their global Centennial Service Challenge in 2014, an effort to serve 100 million people across the globe; and

WHEREAS, according to the organization, there are more than 1.4 million Lions Clubs International members across roughly 46,000 clubs. Lions Clubs International distinguishes itself as the world's largest service club organization with members in more than 200 countries and geographical areas around the world. In Solano County, Lions Clubs International members have formed clubs in Dixon, Rio Vista, Vacaville, Fairfield, Vallejo and Benicia.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Solano County Board of Supervisors hereby recognizes the 100^m anniversary of Lions Clubs International and their continued volunteerism and community engagement across Solano County.

Las Gallinas Lions Club

Las Gallinas Lions join Lions in Sight Mission to Cabo San Lucas, Mexico

Six Lions from Las Gallinas Lions Club (Dolores Cuerva, Graham Forder, John Hammond, Shirley Johnson, Dave Mitchell and Bill Seawell) carrying two SPOT cameras travelled to Cabo San Lucas to serve as technicians at a Lions in Sight (LIS) Mission on May 19 and 20. We were hosted by Angela Medina, Presidentadel Club de Leones, Cabo San Lucas and her husband Julio. The club, which has about 25 members, organized the event including the location, advertising and staffing (for registration etc.).

Over the course of the two days we joined four volunteer doctors (including Dr. John Demshar, who was the lead doctor in our 2015 Clinic in San Rafael) in examining and helping 670 patients, and providing (for free) approximately 625 pairs of eyeglasses (which had previously been shipped from the LIS Warehouse in Vallejo).

Although Cabo San Lucas is well known for its resorts, you do not have to travel very far away from the tourist areas to see the poverty which permeates the region. As in previous missions we were struck, on the one hand by the needs of the people, and on the other by their warmth, graciousness and appreciation for the services we provided.

Each of us has our own stories to tell about the rewards of this kind of service. One example we had was a boy of 14 who had his right eye badly damaged by a thrown rock when he was six. The techs tried several conventional solutions, but it was Dr. John who came up with an out-of-the-box solution which worked and it was so heart-warming to see the smile on the boy's face as his vision was suddenly improved!

This was another great LIS experience - we all recommend it to others.


It is me again. I just received the email that I sent out for the Blue Print and actually scrolled down to the bottom. Imagine that!!! :)

hat's the question posed in a DVD produced by the University of Surrey which traces the history of Lions in our Multiple District from its beginnings in 1950.

Superbly narrated by actress Penelope Keith (pictured) who gave her services voluntarily, the video touches on the origins of the Lions

movement in 1917 when Melvin Jones set up the first Club in Chicago having observed that businessmen (and it was only men in those days of course) could use their drive, initiative and talents to help others less fortunate, thus giving birth to the principles of Lions which survive to this day across the world.

In her voice-over Miss Keith outlines the coming of Lions to what was to become Multiple District 105.

"In wasn't until after the Second World War that Lions reached our shores.

"During the war Canadian servicemen posted to London were appalled by the conditions the children of the Blitz were

living in. Not only were their fathers fighting overseas, and their mothers working in factories, but the children had to deal with poor food, few clothes, constant danger and many of their homes being destroyed around them.

"Through the Lions Clubs in Canada the servicemen raised funds to help, and were expecting the Lions Clubs in England to distribute them. Unfortunately, there was a small problem- there weren't any!

"So instead the Queen Mother, at that time Queen Elizabeth - who was Patron of the Church of England Children's Society, arranged for the Society to distribute the funds on behalf of the Canadian Lions." The story goes on to record how after the war Queen Elizabeth was so grateful to the Canadian Lions that she sent her Equery, Colonel Edward Wyndham (later Lord Leconfield) to Canada to thank them for their help. During

his visit he was invited to Chicago to visit the Headquarters of Lions Clubs International and to see what Lions was really all about. "He was so impressed by what he saw that soon after he

returned to England he set up the first Lions Club in the British Isles and Ireland in 1950 now known as the London Host Club."

Grainy black and white footage of the time shows the venue for the very first meetings of this prestigious new Club, the Criterion Restaurant above the Lillywhite's building in Piccadilly Circus in London's West End.

Tribute is paid in the film to Helen Keller ' an inspirational author, political activist and lecturer who had become blind and deaf at the age 19 months through illness' and recounts how she addressed the 1925 Lions International Convention where she issued her famous challenge to Lions worldwide to 'become Knights of the Blind in the Crusade against Darkness.'

District Student Speaker Foundation Trustee

Hi District 4C-2 Lions Clubs! In case you haven't heard District 4-C2, Ukiah Redwood Empire Student Speaker Indigo Funk won the final MD-4 contest! He will have a total of \$21,000 set aside for his educational use from the Student Speaker Foundation. The breakdown is \$10,000 from the final MD-4 contest, \$6,500 from the Area 2 contest and \$4,500 from the District 4-C2 Contest.

This district has been fortunate in that last year we also had a Speaker, Skye Hawthorn that went to the final contest. He did not win but still collected \$11,000 from the Student Speaker Foundation. Two years ago, the speaker from Valley of the Moon Lions won all the way through the final MD-4 contest, also collecting a total of \$21,000 from the Student Speaker Foundation.

The Student Speaker Foundation gives out a little over \$103, 000 each year in scholarships. Unfortunately, the foundation can not continue to give out scholarships at the same rate without financial support from the districts. In the last eleven months districts throughout the state have donated \$66,774. Districts were listed with their donation amount in the MD-4 Council of Governors meeting booklet last weekend and District 4-C2 has given the least amount of money in the state for the last two years.

While \$66,774 is a large sum of money, it is not enough to cover the scholarships given out in a year. I am asking that all of our clubs consider making at least a \$100 donation to the Student Speaker Foundation, ideally to be received before the start of the new year on July 1st. Students have benefited so much from the Foundation and we have given so little back for future speakers. I know that clubs work hard for their money and have so many requests, but the Student Speaker Foundation needs donations in order to continue to provide the contest scholarships. Living With Keratoconus - Basilio's Story

Lions Eve Foundation of California-Nevada. Inc.

Mr. Basilio Zamudio is a strapping 38 year-old sheet metal worker from Santa Rosa. Basilio remembers learning about his visual condition while attending high school as he was struggling with his schoolwork. A visit to a local eye clinic confirmed the presence of keratoconus. Keratoconus is a progressive eye disease in which the normally round cornea thins and begins to bulge into a cone-like shape. This cone shape deflects light as it enters the eye on its way to the light-sensitive retina, causing distorted vision.

Mr. Zamudio was fit with contact lenses in an effort to slow down the progression of the condition. However, by the time he graduated high school, his vision had become much worse and he fell into a deep depression. After struggling for more than a decade at work, he was referred to the Lions Eye Foundation by Vista Family Health Center in Santa Rosa and the Santa Rosa Host Lions Club. "I had always been too scared to ask for help, I thought it would be just another rejection," stated Basilio. "But help was available and it changed my life. For the first time, I had hope for better vision." Basilio said that discovering that people who did not know him, yet cared for him, was a profound turning point in his life. He suddenly saw a future and a reason to try harder at both his work and personal life.

Keratoconus is the most common corneal dystrophy in the US, affecting one in

every 2000 Americans and is the cause of about 16% of corneal transplants. Keratoconus can occur in one or both eyes and often begins during a person's teens or early 20s. This can be a devastating diagnosis to someone in early adult life.

As the cornea becomes more irregular in shape, it causes progressive nearsightedness and irregular astigmatism to develop, creating additional problems with distorted and blurred vision. Glare and light sensitivity may also occur. Often, keratoconic patients experience changes in their eyeglass prescription every time they visit their eye care practitioner.

What Causes Keratoconus? Keratoconus is often associated with overexposure to ultraviolet rays (from the sun), excessive eye rubbing, or a history of poorly fitted contact lenses creating a chronic eye irritation. New research suggests that the weakening of the corneal tissue that leads to keratoconus may be due to an imbalance of enzymes within the cornea. This imbalance makes the cornea more susceptible to oxidative damage from compounds called free radicals that cause the cornea to weaken and bulge forward.

Diagnostic Testing: At the Ophthalmic Diagnostic Services, the testing department at the Lions Eye Clinic, Mr. Zamudio had extensive corneal topographic mapping using a sophisticated instrument called the Pentacam Scheimpflug Anterior Segment Analyzer. Slit Lamp Biomicrography (digital images of the corneal layers) provided solid photographic documentation of the pre and post operative state of the patient's cornea. All of these tests are provided without charge to our patients.


Basilio had his first cornea transplant through the Lions Eye Clinic and is doing well. "After surgery, I could not believe the light! So much more light was coming into my eye and I could see better," exclaimed Mr. Zamudio. "My doctors are slowly removing the stitches, and I am looking forward to even better vision. Once this eye heals, I would like surgery on my other eye".

"I really feel like I am in heaven here on earth. I have a much better attitude. I think positive things about people, and with this positive energy I have been trying to volunteer and give back. Being positive and giving back to help others gives me such a calm and peaceful feeling," stated Brasilio. "Thank you Lions!"

Retinal Lasers in the Lions Eye Clinic - by Judy Chen, MD, Retina Fellow

Lasers are used in a wide variety of retinal diseases, including diabetic retinopathy, retinal vein occlusions, macular degeneration, retinal tumors, and retinal tears or detachments. In diabetic retinopathy and retinal vein occlusions, blockage of blood flow into the eye, either from chronic hardening of the arteries from elevated blood sugars or a blood clot, results in widespread loss of blood flow to the peripheral retina. This ischemic retina sends out signaling molecules, such as vascular endothelial growth factor, which induces the growth of new blood vessels in a process known as neovascularization. However, these new blood vessels are very fragile and can often bleed or cause scarring, both of which can lead to vision loss. Ablation of the peripheral retina, laser therapy can be used to cut off the blood supply to these lesions, causing shrinkage or even complete resolution without the need for surgery. Lastly, laser can be used to barricade or wall-off retinal tears or small retinal detachments in the clinic, preventing patients from developing vision loss or needing surgical intervention.



Although laser treatment has been widely utilized for over 50 years, the recent development of semi-automated pattern retinal photocoagulation lasers have revolutionized the way

we treat these conditions. The Vitra laser, which was recently so generously donated by the Lions Eye Foundation to the eye clinic, is one of these premium laser systems. These systems are able to create well-aligned grid patterns of 4 to 25 spots with a single press of the foot pedal. Because these spots tend to be smaller, more homogenous, and less intense, they have many advantages over traditional laser including: less treatment pain, faster application, less inflammation, improved targeting of small lesions, and less risk of enlargement of the laser burns over time.

Over 70% of the patients seen in the retina clinic have diabetic eye disease, so management of diabetic retinopathy is the most common indication for laser treatment. Diabetic retinopathy, a sight threatening complication of diabetes mellitus, is currently the leading cause of irreversible vision loss in working-age adults in the United States. Most patients are referred with proliferative disease, meaning they have active neovascularization, or growth of anomalous new blood vessels, which often bleed and can cause severe loss of vision. Laser therapy is applied in the periphery around the optic nerve and the central part of the retina, known as the macula, as shown in the schematic. This reduces the overall oxygen demand of the eye and induces regression of the neovascularization and prevents further bleeding. With this treatment, many patients' vision can be saved.

Despite advances in medicine, laser is still the gold standard treatment for many conditions that affect the eye. Without this capability, we would be doing a great disservice to our patients and would be unable to appropriately train our resident physicians. We appreciate the support of the Lions Eye Foundation in helping us to provide the best care to these underserved populations.

CPMC Resident Dr. Sam Reiter

Sam Reiter, MD was born and raised in Santa Rosa, California. He studied History at UCLA, where he worked in a multiple sclerosis lab and had the opportunity to volunteer in rural Sri Lanka, an experience that ignited his passion for international health. He gladly returned to Northern California for medical school at UC Davis, where he further pursued global health and ophthalmology with the help of amazing mentors. During an elective year, Sam led a team to Nicaragua to work in a rural community clinic, and also spearheaded a research project on the role of cooking smoke in cataract and pterygium formation in Nicaragua. He then volunteered in Bhutan where he saw firsthand the staggering prevalence of preventable blindness in the developing world, confirming his decision to become an ophthalmologist.

Sam hopes to devote his career to people who lack access to adequate eye care in his community and abroad, and is therefore thrilled to be training at CPMC. He is passionate about the role of nutrition in health, utilizing his pre-residency research time to establish a diabetes education program at the Lions Eye Clinic. Sam enjoys getting outside whenever he can to play soccer, run, hike, bike, and explore all things Bay Area. He also loves cooking, farmers' markets, reading, traveling, and most of all his family, friends and dog.

What is the "Redwood Lions Memorial Foundation"?

The "Redwood Lions Memorial Foundation is a 501-C3 foundation that was set up in District 4C2 as a District project. The foundation consists of two separate funds, the "Investment" fund and the "Disaster relief" fund.

The "**Investment**" fund consists of monies that have been donated by individuals and corporations and this money is invested in dividend stocks, mutual funds and bond funds. The Dividends raised are used to support the Earle Baum Center, Lions Clubs and individuals in our district. This fund presently raises approximately \$25,000 per year with 75% being donated to various causes and 25% being re-invested.

The "**Disaster relief**" fund is monies received from Lion Clubs and individuals and is directed to immediate disasters, such as "the Valley Fire" and "the Clayton Fire" and other district needs . This money is not invested but is used to help victims immediately. Last year we received \$46,832.07 for the Valley Fire and spent over \$48,000.00 to help victims of this terrible disaster. So far this year we have received a \$10,000.00 grant from LCIF and we are working with the clubs around "South shore" to help people in need in that area. Any monies that clubs wish to donate to RLMF for our "disaster relief" fund shall be applied 100% to help those victims and other club needs in our district.

One of our major projects that we support is the "Earle Balm Center". We spend approximately \$10,000.00 each year helping the center with its vision projects. Last year we purchased a "multi use" printer (\$6795.00) that can be used by office personal as well as those that are visually impaired. The visually impaired can access, text to read, and use the available technologies to help them utilize the advantages of this machine.

We also spent \$ 2600.00 to upgrade the center lighting this last year.

We received a \$10,000.00 grant this year to be used for the "Quest" program in the Roseland school area. That money is now being applied as specified in that grant.

We plan to continue our \$10,000.00 donation each year to "Earle Balm Center" and appreciate any assistance from Clubs in District 4C2 to help us reach that goal. Our "Redwood Lions Memorial Fund" is also ready to assist Clubs in our district and we welcome any charity money it receives from clubs to help in that effort. If your club has charity monies in your budget and wish to help, please contact any member of the board of RLMF and they will be glad to assist you.
