
"SPECIAL MESSAGE TO OUR PRESIDENTS"

What is the "Redwood Lions Memorial Foundation"?

The "Redwood Lions Memorial Foundation is a 501-C3 foundation that was set up in District 4C2 as a District project. The foundation consists of two separate funds, the "Investment" fund and the "Disaster relief" fund.

The "**Investment**" fund consists of monies that have been donated by individuals and corporations and this money is invested in dividend stocks, mutual funds and bond funds. The Dividends raised are used to support the Earle Baum Center, Lions Clubs and individuals in our district. This fund presently raises approximately \$25,000 per year with 75% being donated to various causes and 25% being re-invested.

The "**Disaster relief**" fund is monies received from Lion Clubs and individuals and is directed to immediate disasters, such as "the Valley Fire" and "the Clayton Fire" and other district needs. This money is not invested but is used to help victims immediately. Last year we received \$46,832.07 for the Valley Fire and spent over \$48,000.00 to help victims of this terrible disaster. So far this year we have received a \$10,000.00 grant from LCIF and we are working with the clubs around "South shore" to help people in need in that area. Any monies that clubs wish to donate to RLMF for our "disaster relief" fund shall be applied 100% to help those victims and other club needs in our district.

One of our major projects that we support is the "Earle Balm Center". We spend approximately \$10,000.00 each year helping the center with its vision projects. Last year we purchased a "multi use" printer (\$6795.00) that can be used by office personal as well as those that are visually impaired. The visually impaired can access, text to read, and use the available technologies to help them utilize the advantages of this machine. We also spent \$ 2600.00 to upgrade the center lighting this last year.


We received a \$10,000.00 grant this year to be used for the "Quest" program in the Roseland school area. That money is now being applied as specified in that grant.

We plan to continue our \$10,000.00 donation each year to "Earle Balm Center" and appreciate any assistance from Clubs in District 4C2 to help us reach that goal. Our "Redwood Lions Memorial Fund" is also ready to assist Clubs in our district and we welcome any charity money it receives from clubs to help in that effort. If your club has charity monies in your budget and wish to help, please contact any member of the board of RLMF and they will be glad to assist you.

Diabetes Screenings

Diabetes is a growing world epidemic. Currently, 1 in 2 (46.5%) of adults with diabetes are undiagnosed. The purpose of diabetes screening is to identify asymptomatic individuals who may have diabetes and not know it, and refer them to qualified healthcare professionals for additional assessment. A diabetes screening can help detect <u>prediabetes</u> as well as <u>diabetes</u>.

Organizing a Diabetes Screening

Partner with healthcare professionals to carry out your screening event: Government health departments, universities, hospitals, nurses, certified diabetes educators or private physicians often agree to perform free or low cost public screenings. They are knowledgeable about local healthcare laws and appropriate medical screening equipment and supplies to be used.

Obtain legal clearance/permits from local authorities: Adhere to the appropriate healthcare laws and regulations for your jurisdiction when conducting health screenings.

Select a date and location for the screening: Possible locations can include schools, libraries, places of worship, community centers or homes for the elderly. If your district has a diabetes mobile screening unit, you may consider reserving it for your event.

Provide advance publicity: Use social media platforms, newsletters and public announcements to notify the community about the date and location of the screening.

Stay in touch with community partners (medical professionals, manager of screening location, volunteers, etc.)

Establish a referral plan in advance of the screening: Anticipate your screening will identify people at risk for pre-diabetes and diabetes. Make sure those with positive screening results will have access to additional medical care and/or diagnostic tests.

Conducting a Diabetes Screening

Organize and set up the screening room.

Provide free transportation for persons who lack access.

Assist medical professional partners with record-keeping functions.

Distribute professional diabetes information and <u>publications</u>.

Provide other assistance to healthcare professionals in accordance with local laws and regulations.

Follow Up After the Screening

Send letters of appreciation to persons involved in the screening: This includes healthcare professionals who donated their time and expertise, community centers that provided a venue and medical companies or local healthcare providers that donated equipment and supplies.

Provide publicity after your screening: Let your community know about the details of your event, including the number of persons who benefited from the free public screening. Use social media to highlight your event and issue a press release or other community announcement.

• Use <u>MyLCI</u> to share information about your screening.

Organize Diabetes Service Projects

More than 422 million people worldwide have diabetes, and this number is increasing in every country. Diabetes is a leading cause of blindness, amputations, kidney failure, heart attacks and stroke, and early death. The International Diabetes Federation estimates that by 2040 there will be more than 642 million living with the disease.

Organize diabetes service projects and activities in your area by becoming a diabetes chairperson in your club, district or multiple district. Motivate Lions to undertake service projects that:

- Support efforts leading to the control and treatment of diabetes and its complications.
- Promote diabetes awareness, education and prevention.
- Provide programs and assistance to underserved children and adults who are living with diabetes.

The club, district and multiple district diabetes chairpersons are appointed by the club president, district governor and council chairperson, respectively. By working together, diabetes chairpersons can organize effective service projects to help fight diabetes in their communities.

Diabetes Chairperson Responsibilities

Set goals:

- Evaluate the effectiveness of current diabetes projects.
- Develop goals and an overall action plan.
- Submit the plan for the club president's, district governor's or council chairperson's approval.

Communicate goals and project ideas:

• Inform Lions through the multiple district and club websites, newsletters and social media accounts.

Incorporate new project ideas:

- Encourage Lions to share news of their diabetes projects.
- Avoid duplication of local, regional or national programs.
- Work with local health care professionals to determine community needs and provide the most appropriate services.

Arrange seminars and workshops:

- Provide educational resources and information on diabetes awareness, prevention and control.
- Invite health care professionals, such as doctors, nurses or certified diabetes educators as speakers to help motivate Lions to participate.
- Discuss projects that can provide outreach to underserved populations who are at high risk for diabetes or living with the disease.

Solicit feedback:

• Find out how to further support Lions in planning diabetes projects.

Report diabetes projects:

• Share news about diabetes projects with the multiple district or district public relations chairperson.

• Report your activities to <u>MyLCI</u>.

Diabetic Retinopathy

<u>Print</u>

LCIF assists Lions in fighting diabetes through two grant programs: SightFirst grant funding to support diabetic retinopathy programs and <u>Core 4 funding</u> support for diabetes programs.

The Problem

Diabetes occurs when the body is unable to produce or properly use insulin—the hormone responsible for converting food into energy for daily life. Nearly 5 million deaths each year are attributed to diabetes, and long-term complications include cardiovascular disease, stroke, kidney disease and amputations.

Diabetic retinopathy, another complication of diabetes, is the result of damage to the blood vessels of the retina—the light sensitive tissue at the back of the eye. In some cases, the blood vessels swell and leak, while in others there is abnormal growth of new vessels. The disease usually affects both eyes and most often occurs in individuals who have had diabetes for many years.

Global Impact

Diabetic retinopathy accounts for nearly 5 percent of the world's 39 million people who suffer from blindness, and has become a growing cause of vision loss in adults of working age (20-65) in industrialized countries. Once vision is lost from diabetic retinopathy, it cannot be restored. People lacking regular health care at retirement age and of minority background are considered most susceptible.

The number of people at risk for diabetic retinopathy is on the rise. Currently more than 382 million people have diabetes worldwide with the largest increase in recent years taking place in developing countries. Nearly half of all people with diabetes will develop some degree of diabetic retinopathy during their lifetime. After 15 years of living with diabetes, approximately 10 percent develop severe visual impairment and about 2 percent become blind.

Treatment

Diabetic retinopathy can be avoided with prevention or good control of diabetes. Once diabetic retinopathy is diagnosed, progression of the disease and loss of vision can be reduced by 90 percent with improved control of diabetes and ongoing diabetic retinopathy treatment.

Treatment options include laser surgery to help shrink blood vessels in the retina or, in more serious cases, vitrectomy surgery to remove blood from the center of the eye. Rehabilitation and regular eye exams are critical to maximizing diabetic retinopathy treatment benefits.

SightFirst's Work

Since 1995, SightFirst has approved US\$2.8 million for 22 diabetic retinopathy projects in 11 countries where diabetic retinopathy is a significant public health concern: Algeria, Bahrain, Brazil, Chile, Fiji, India, Pakistan, Peru, Samoa, Spain and Venezuela. The projects have been comprehensive in nature with activities ranging from public education and professional training, to screening, treatment and low vision services.

SightFirst's diabetic retinopathy accomplishments include:

- Educating more than 1.5 million people
- Training more than 2,000 professionals
- Conducting more than 23,000 surgeries
- Screening more than 140,000 patients

Funding Priorities

SightFirst remains committed to combating diabetic retinopathy. Priorities for projects include:

- Identifying appropriate project sites: Sight First will continue to support the development or expansion of diabetic retinopathy screening and treatment programs at well-established diabetes and eye care clinics that target underserved communities and do not detract from existing eye care services.
- Diabetes care integration: Projects should serve those already diagnosed with diabetes, and diabetic retinopathy treatment should be part of their overall diabetes care. Also, projects should align with national diabetes prevention and treatment plans where they exist.
- High quality programming: Projects must have strong evaluative, monitoring, tracking and cost sharing components.
- Sustainable programming: Projects should include significant cost sharing in addition to SightFirst funding. Support might also include public/private partnerships and in-kind donations of human resources, consumables and facilities.
- Lions engagement: Lions should have hands-on involvement as well as opportunities for advocacy.

In general, Sight First projects must focus on the major causes of blindness on national or large regional levels. These projects reach populations who are underserved or who have limited or no access to eye health care services. The program funds high-quality, sustainable projects that deliver eye care services, develop infrastructure, train personnel and/or provide rehabilitation and education in underserved communities.

Lions Clubs International's Centennial Celebration at Convention

More than 30,000 Lions from all over the world arrived in Chicago last month to celebrate LCI's 100th anniversary at the International Convention. Among the many events that took place, a highlight was watching the Special Olympics – Leos "Mission: Inclusion" Unified Basketball Clinic presented by NBA great, Sam Perkins. Leos and Special Olympics athletes

participated in basketball drills and scrimmages while working together and learning more about one another.

Convention is a great time to thank the generous Lions who donated. A special thanks is in order for Melvin Jones Fellows, Progressive Melvin Jones Fellows, Melvin Jones Fellowship clubs, and those in the Humanitarian Partner program. This year, we raised one of the highest donation amounts in LCIF Convention history. Because of your contributions, communities all around the world will receive help when it is needed.

The Project for Elimination of Avoidable Childhood Blindness

For more than 15 years, LCIF's Sight First program and the World Health Organization (WHO) have partnered to serve more than 127 million children by working to eliminate avoidable childhood blindness. The Project for Elimination of Avoidable Childhood Blindness is an initiative that began in 2001. Since then, 51 Child Friendly Eye Care Centers have been established and supported in 50 countries within Africa, the Americas, the Eastern Mediterranean, Europe, Southeast Asia, and the Western Pacific. The centers provide preventive, therapeutic, and rehabilitative eye care services for children aged 0-15 years. To date, more than 67,000 pediatric eye care staff have been trained, more than 13 million children have been screened for eye diseases, and more than 127 million children have received treatment. There have also been nearly one million education sessions for parents, caregivers and healthcare staff. Because of your donations to LCIF, millions of children have been given the chance to avoid childhood blindness.

Club LCIF Coordinators Position Update

The <u>Club LCIF Coordinator</u> is an ambassador for LCIF at the club level and is crucial to the promotion of our foundation. This person shares LCIF stories, motivates fellow Lions to support LCIF, and enables LCIF to advance its humanitarian work both locally and globally. Club LCIF Coordinators will be equipped with resources that will allow them to champion the goals of the foundation to Lions. A new policy has been put into effect to help fill this vital role at the club level. 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



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
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
